Apostrophes Possession

Use an apostrophe to show possession
(one thing belongs to another).

It was the dog's bone.

Add 's to dog to show the bone belonged
to it.

Full stops, question and exclamation marks

A full stop shows that you have finished a sentence. Every sentence *must* end with a full stop, question or exclamation mark. This sentence ends with a full stop.

Question marks

A question mark is used to show when someone has asked a question.

Are we going on holiday next week?

Exclamation marks

An exclamation mark is used to show when something is surprising or forceful.

Ouch! That really hurt!

Put “ ” around what words the speaker says.

A new speech sentence starts with a capital letter (even if it is the middle of another sentence).

Separate what was said from speaker with a comma unless there is already a ? or an !
